The Bread Box has been an amazing endeavor. We are now in our sixth year and have raised over \$30,000 for the soup kitchen by bringing local and national musical acts to Willimantic. We have met wonderful people, from the musicians who play to the wonderful crowds that come out to enjoy the music. We have also had the great fortune to be supported by monetary grants from the Lester & Phyllis Foster Foundation, and the family of Jim Romanow that have allowed us to make improvements to the stage, and the sound and lighting.

To Our Church Family:

On October 25th, our names were submitted to the congregation as the Church Council's recommendation to be the Search Committee for our next settled pastor. Church members present approved the Council recommendation. We will be commissioned during worship on November 29th. We are both respectful and grateful for the trust that has been placed in us.

Our committee met with Rev. Dr. Thomas Clough, Eastern Regional Conference Minister, CT UCC, who will work closely with us in the 'Search and Call' process. It is a detailed process, and it is important for us to be thorough so that we ultimately present to you as a candidate, the right person to serve as our next settled pastor.

Our first task is to prepare the Local Church Profile. This is a multi-page, very comprehensive document. We will get some of the data from church records and reports. Information gathered from the Holy Cow survey will be helpful as well. We may also be asking individuals, boards, and committees for additional input. Once our profile is completed, our vacancy will be listed in "UCC Employment Opportunities." We will then begin receiving and reviewing the ministerial profiles of applicants. The names of the applicants will be held in strict confidence within our committee. We ask you to respect the need for this to be so.

We will make every effort to keep you informed of our progress on a regular basis. Whether you did or did not do the online Holy Cow survey last spring, your input to this committee is welcome. You may contact any of us to share your thoughts.

During this time of transition for our church, we are fortunate and very grateful to have the leadership of our interim pastor, Reverend Dr. Robert (Bob) Wright. Please keep us in your prayers.

#### Refugee resettlement meeting: Dec 6 / First Mansfield / 1:30pm

The First Church of Christ in Mansfield Center, Congregational, UCC will host an information meeting on refugee resettlement on Sunday, December 6 from 1:30 - 3:30 pm. We hope you can come; **you are encouraged to pass this invitation on** to friends, neighbors, congregants, co-workers and others you think might be interested in learning more about the current world-wide refugee crisis and what we in Eastern Connecticut might do to help.

The purposes of this gathering are to:

- Build our common understanding of the scope of the current refugee crisis, and learn about current UN and US policies and procedures concerning refugees;
- Describe the role of organizations that sponsor refugee resettlement, and learn about IRIS in particular (IRIS = Integrated Refugee & Immigrant Services the largest resettlement organization in CT);
- Learn the various ways individuals and broad coalitions of churches and other organizations can help resettle refugees. Particular attention will be paid to "co-sponsorship" and how a co-sponsoring initiative might be formed in our area.
- Share preliminary ideas about resources / people / organizations in the Quiet Corner might be identified and recruited to assist in refugee resettlement;
- Invite you to write elected officials demonstrating support for higher refugee entrance commitments into the US and support for greatly increasing the number of refugees allocated to CT.

Chris George, the Executive Director of IRIS will be with us; there will be time for Q+A and informal conversations.

There also will be some handouts, and we plan to offer refreshments so a quick "RSVP" to firstchurchmansfield@snet.net will be greatly appreciated as it will help us prepare. If you're feeling led to bring a snack offering to the gathering, you will receive our praise and the wonderful warm fuzzy feeling that comes along with making a meaningful contribution. Thanks in advance!
