We all play many roles in life. For me, mother, grandmother, sister, aunt, mentor, and especially, friend – a chosen role. It is fascinating to be all those things, plus careers and hobbies, and being part of a community, like a 'church family.' Think about your life – how it has grown to be good for you; all the 'perks' in your life that create happiness. It chases away dark clouds, brings a rainbow of color to the sky, and promises sunshine.

WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY

World Communion Sunday is celebrated on the first Sunday in October and offers congregations from around the world the opportunity to experience Holy Communion as a global community of faith. On this Sunday Christians in every culture break bread and drink of the cup to affirm how important the Church of Jesus Christ is and how each congregation can be interconnected one with another in service and Christian unity.

The Church is one in the Spirit and one in Christ and Christians celebrate communion on this day in as many ways as there are congregations, whether in a grand cathedral, a mud hut, under a tent, on a hillside, or in a meetinghouse.

World Communion Sunday originated in the Shadyside Presbyterian Church in 1933, was adopted throughout the US Presbyterian Church in 1936 and subsequently spread to other denominations. In 1940, the Federal Council of Churches (now the National Council of Churches), endorsed World Communion Sunday and began to promote it to Christian Churches worldwide.

So let us be mindful on this Sunday that Jesus is present wherever two or three or more are gathered in His name when we all share the Meal where Christ is our Host. We are all connected by his love and when we live and serve by his example we can transcend all boundaries of geography and language. Around His Table together, we broadcast our faith to the world and say,

"Come and dine; there is room for all!"

We are to build up the body of Christ—not break it down. Let us take these words of Christ to heart: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hid. Nor do people light a lamp and place it under a bushel, but on a stand. And it gives light to all in the house. Let your light shine before others that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 5:14-16)
