I just received a gift – a book called *Everyday Sacred* by Sue Bender. I have not had time to read anything except the preface. It gave me an idea for a "Loft-y Thoughts." It tells of how a monk would go out each day with an empty bowl in his hands. Whatever is placed in the bowl will be his nourishment for the day.

I thought about myself and visualized an empty bowl in my hands. With what would my bowl be filled? Every day is different and I am placed in many settings for hours at a time. I close my eyes and see friends offering spoonfuls of love and concern into the bowl. Sometimes it seems to be filled quickly. Perhaps I stumble and the bowl tilts and some spills out. I feel empty. My Journey to Zion - Some thoughts by Jon Magnuson

For a number of years now, I've kept a tiny card on my desk at work that reads, simply, "Dear Lord, I desire today that you will use my life as a channel of your love." The words on this small piece of paper, placed where I can't help but spot it several times throughout the often hectic day, serve as a constant reminder of how I believe God asks us each to be a reflection of, and witness to, His Grace and Love throughout our everyday interactions with others. Perhaps better than anything I could hope to author, this unassuming prayer captures my daily Journey to Zion - a journey, candidly-speaking, which like us all has both its high points and its challenges, but a journey just the same. When I stop to consider my personal journey, one which has unfolded chiefly for me during my adult years, and one which has been punctuated by life-transforming events including marriage, fatherhood, a clear and undeniable personal call to ministry (which continues to unfold!), and much more, it's impossible for me to not acknowledge God's great mystery and intervening presence in all things.

As I consider what I might share with you about my *journey*, I'm reminded of the moment back in 2001 when I was first approached by a member of our congregation's Board of Deacons and asked if I would consider joining the board that coming year. Our personal journeys are dotted by such moments, by opportunities offered, and by encounters with others. It is in how we respond to those moments, opportunities, and encounters that we are defined. My decision to accept the invitation to join the diaconate that coming February was one of those moments for me, one that unquestionably has shaped my ongoing *Journey to Zion* ever since. For it placed me on a new path, clearer to me at that moment than any other and through a newly focused service, of seeking a closer relationship with God and a more practiced life of spirituality in service to others.

This February I will begin my fourth term as a deacon in service to our congregation; and as in each preceding time, it is an opportunity that I am profoundly grateful for. Each term has helped further define my *journey* by presenting me with new challenges, deep joys, an increasing awareness of my own spirituality, and an appreciation for God's plan unfolding in my life and in my family's life. My earliest experiences as a deacon were, without question, a principle reason I decided to seek more formal religious education, resulting in my eventual graduation from Hartford Seminary. As a result of, and through, the many new relationships made during my seminary experience, and in the sharing of my growing faith with others during that time and since, I'd like to think that I was (and am) giving life to the words printed on that little prayer card on my desk - that I am, indeed, "using my life as a channel of God's love."

I hope that what has come across here, as I share just a little about my personal *Journey to Zion*, is that it has been, and continues to be, a journey which is foremost about my desire to be a channel of God's love to others through all that I say and in all that I do - and doing so only by God's Grace, even within, and fully acknowledging, my own fallibility and limitations. Ultimately, emerging out of my *journey* is a desire to grow both through and in my personal relationships with others; to seek and witness the presence of God in all of my life circumstances; and to encourage and celebrate God's presence in the lives of those around me. I honestly have no idea what is ahead for me as I continue my *journey* (do any of us?), but if it's any indication, my Epiphany "Star" Sunday word this year is *Prayerfulness*. And so, if the prayer written on the small card at my desk serves as the guidepost for my *journey*, my desire then is that the following scripture verse be a constant marker and serve as words of encouragement for me along the way - "Search my heart O God, and know me..." (Psalm 139:23) Let the journey continue! Amen!

We have recently installed a system in the sanctuary called the "Hearing Loop System". This system works with hearing aids that have a "T-Coil" installed and sends sound directly to the hearing aid from the present sound system.

If you have a "T-Coil" in your hearing device, and you have the ability to turn it on (if it is not already turned on), turn it on so that you can hear the service better.

If you do not know if you have the "T-Coil" in your hearing device, or you do not know how to turn it on, contact your hearing device provider and ask what you need to do to make this work for you.

For others in the congregation with hearing problems, we also have headphone devices that work with this system that will allow you to hear the service better. See one of the deacons for assistance.

If you have any questions, see me after the service and I will try to answer any questions you may have.

To Our Church Family:

We expect that at the time you are reading this March 2016 Circuit Rider, we will have begun to receive profiles of pastoral candidates interested in being our next settled pastor. Our Local Church Profile, the comprehensive document which describes our church, as well as the UCC Job Opportunity listing has been submitted, reviewed, and approved by Rev. Dr. Thomas Clough, our Eastern Regional CT Conference Minister. To complete the job listing, we sought input from the Board of Trustees on an appropriate and affordable compensation package. We met our goal of having the profile completed by the end of January.

The next phase will be reviewing the profiles we receive and determining candidates who we think might be a good choice for us. It will be exciting and may also be quite challenging. We continue to welcome your thoughts about the process, however, this phase of reviewing the profiles and selecting possible candidates to interview, will be strictly confidential and we ask you to respect the need for this to be so.

We are in the Lenten season now, a time when people often make a commitment to set aside a special time for reflection and prayer, to listen for God's voice in their life. This might also be a good time for all of us to think about change.

Change has begun for us at the First Congregational Church of Lebanon. Pastor Bob became our interim pastor last July. The role of an interim pastor is not to pick up the playbook of the previous pastor and play the game as that person did; it is not to simply do the Sunday sermons and officiate at other services as called upon. The job is also, and perhaps most importantly, to help us toward our call of a new pastor by introducing us to change. Unlike when a pastor is on vacation and we have someone 'fill in,' the job of the interim pastor is to show us what it will be like to 'do new things,' and maybe 'do things in a new way.'

It's only natural that we experience many emotions and thoughts when we contemplate having a new pastor. Some people are excited and optimistic; others are worried about what the changes will be; many of us have a combination of emotions; and it's likely some people don't want any change. But there is going to be a new person, a new settled pastor, and that alone will be a change. So, we should take some time to examine our feelings about this and ask ourselves what are we excited about? What do we look forward to, hope for? What are we anxious about? And we should also ask ourselves how these feelings affect our individual relationship with God? How do they affect who we want to be as people of God? And, with all of our church history behind us, what is important for our future?

In the 315 years of the First Congregational Church of Lebanon, there have been 27 pastors. We are searching with open minds and open hearts for our 28th pastor. In this Lenten time of contemplation and reflection, please think about how we can carry on the work of this church with our next pastor. Please keep us in your prayers.
