
Pastor's Corner

To Our Church Family:

When we wrote to you in March, we said that we expected we'd be receiving ministerial profiles by the time you were reading that letter. And, we have been receiving profiles! As of the middle of April we have received 31 profiles. The profiles are anywhere from 15-20 pages each. Copies are made for everyone, (*yes, we know – so much paper! But it's doubled-sided copying, and we shred them when we've finished. We will just have to be ok with that, and hope shredded paper is useful in some way).* We read each profile very carefully and discuss them as a group. All decisions are group decisions. We have also read, listened to, and viewed many sermons. We did a mock interview in March and met again with our conference minister, Rev. Dr. Tom Clough to discuss our progress and the next steps in the process. We have identified candidates in whom we have particular interest and have sent them our profile. We have extended invitations for interviews and expect to be meeting with candidates soon.

We meet weekly and greatly appreciate the cooperation of the boards and committees who have given up their meeting space in the Memorial Room so that we can meet and discuss profiles in a place where we have privacy and can maintain the confidentiality of the candidates. When we interview, we will be asking for 'the whole place' – meaning, not just the Memorial Room, but the sanctuary, fellowship hall, and the classrooms as well, so that we can provide our candidates with a total picture of our church.

Some of you have asked if we have a deadline, a goal of when we will call a new pastor. We do not. We have been moving steadily along, preparing our profile, reviewing and making decisions on the ministerial profiles we receive, and soon we will be interviewing. We expect to continue receiving profiles as well. The only goal we have is to call the right person to be our next settled pastor.

And in that regard, we've come to know that some of our church family is not attending Sunday worship 'until we get the new pastor.' This is troubling to us because whether you are serving on this committee, on one of standing boards and committees, or are a member or friend of this church - you're an important part of the process. We miss you. Just being here is important. We know 'what we had,' we don't yet know 'what we'll get;' but we do know that the more people we have helping to shape who we want to be going forward, the better it will be. So we hope that you will reconsider and remember what brought you here in the first place, and join us again during this interim time. If, at any time, you would like to share your thoughts with us, please do not hesitate to do so. There are ten of us. We represent all of you. It's an honor, a very important mission, and we take very seriously our responsibility to call the 28th pastor of this church.
